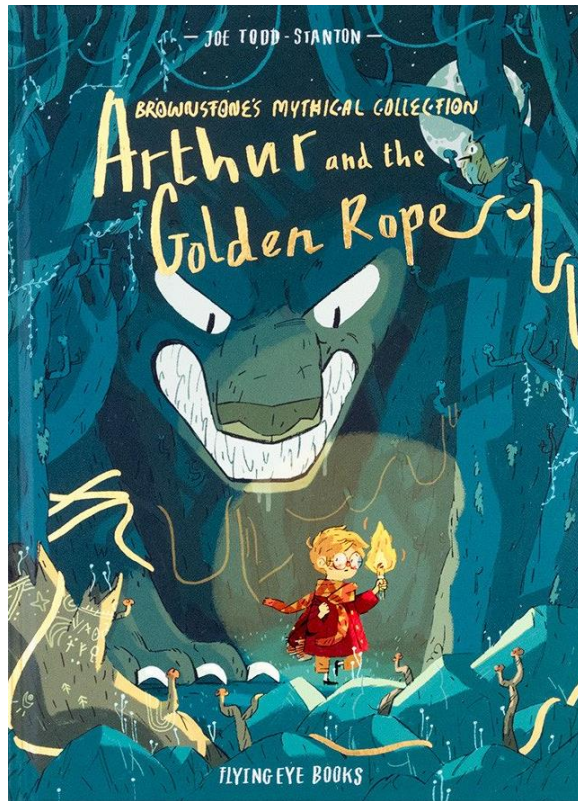


Arthur and the Golden Rope by Joe Todd-Stanton

Townfolk – The people who live the town

Key Words

Artefact: an object that has been made by a person, such as a tool or a decoration, especially one that is of historical interest

Ancestors: a person related to you who lived a long time ago

Ancient: from a long time ago, having lasted for a very long time e.g. ancient civilisations/rights/law

Colossal: extremely large

Erupt: when a volcano erupts, it explodes with flames and rocks out of the top

Gravely: something serious e.g. gravely ill, nodded gravely

Outwit: to get an advantage over someone by acting more cleverly and often using a trick e.g. the fox outwits the hunter

Peril: great danger, or something that is very dangerous e.g. the journey through the mountains was fraught with peril

Ravage: to cause great damage to something e.g. the area has been ravaged by floods

Triumphant: achieved a great victory or achievement
