

Sports Premium Report 2022-23

At Hollingbourne, our vision is for ALL pupils leaving us are **physically literate** and have the **knowledge**, **skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy**, **active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport.

As a school, we use the following key indicators to measure improvements:

- 1. Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offer
- 2. Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- 3. The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school'sbudget should fund these.

Sports premium funding entitles us to £16,000 plus an additional payment of £10 per pupil. As a school, we estimate that we will receive £16,810.

The funding enables us to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport we offer. We can there use the premium to:

- Develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- Make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Broadly, we will use our funding to:

- Hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- Provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- Introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- Support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and <u>Change4Life</u> clubs
- Run sport competitions
- increase pupils' participation in the <u>School Games</u>
- participate in sports activities with other schools
