## Introduction

Fifi was bought as a puppy, born on February $14^{\text {th }} 2012$ and is a family pet. She belongs to Mrs Bradley-Wyatt. Fifi is a Yorkie Terrier mixed with a little Chihuahua. Fifi is a calm and friendly dog who has been socialised with children of all ages. Fifi regularly visits the vets and is up to date with all flea, worm and innoculations. She is deemed fit and healthy. While the school has been open to key worker children, Fifi has made some visits with the permission of parents. She has shown she has an excellent temperament and the children present have already made strong connections with the children. In a recent questionnaire (2.6.2020), all children attending said that they would like Fifi to visit and had clear purposeful reasons for this.

| Direct interaction with children/ staff | If dog not in the right frame of mind it might scratch or not want interaction | Med | - HBW to assess dog's mood in the morning to ensure appropriate to bring dog in. Rest days will be given and regular walks/ breaks from children to ensure positive interactions. <br> - Treats and rewards given for all positive interactions <br> - Immediately stop interaction if child or dog behaves incorrectly <br> - Ensure children and adults follow agreed code of interaction | Low |
| Incorrect interaction with the school dog | Future interactions could be affected and the dog's training impacted | Med | - Agreed codes will be developed for all to follow <br> - Rewards and treats given for correct behavior <br> - Reminders will be given of code when interacting if there are instances of children forgetting <br> - If serious or repeated, interaction will stop and the dog returned to the office | Low |


| Use of rewards/ treats | Children / staff could be harmed if the dog is excited about a treat. Children could contract germs after handling treats/ coming into contact with dogs mouth/tongue | Low | - The dog has been trained to follow a visual cue to show you have a treat. She has been trained to sit when this happens. <br> - Remind children they can ONLY given a treat if the dog is behaving correctly. <br> - Children will be reminded to wash their hands <br> - Treats will be stored away out of reach of children. <br> - No treats can be given without the supervision of adults. | Low |

| Pupil/ staff knowledge of interaction with a dog | If staff/ children do not know how to interact correctly, this could result in harm to themselves of the dog | Med | - There will be an agreed code of interaction with the dog which will be shared with staff and children. <br> - The code will be published as a reminder as well as verbal reminders given <br> - Should inappropriate interaction continue, then the interaction will be immediately stopped. | Low |
| Worms/ fleas | If not treated, worms etc could be transferred to humans | Med | - The dog is treated monthly. The products used are ordered by prescription from the vet to ensure these are the most effective <br> - Seek veterinary advice if needed | Low |
| Faeces | If children/ adults come into contact with faeces some germs could be transferred | Med | - The school dog will only be walked under supervision <br> - Poo bags will be used to pick up and dispose of the faeces <br> - Only adults will pick up the faeces <br> - A specific space will be allocated for the dog's toilet routines <br> - If a child finds any faeces on the field they will report it to an adult immediately <br> - Adults will wash hands immediately after removing any faeces. | Low |
| Allergies | If a child is allergic to dogs they could become unwell | Med | - The dog is covered in hair which is hypoallergenic and will not affect asthmatics. <br> - The dog is regularly groomed and bathed <br> - If a child becomes unwell during interaction with the dog, the dog will be immediately removed. | Low |


| Children's access to school dogs resources | A child could consume food/ treats and become unwell | Med | - The dogs resources will be stored in a safe place <br> - Resources such as food and treats will be out of reach of children <br> - No child will be able to access the dog's rest space without adult supervision | Low |

| Contact with food preparation areas | If a dog enters food prep areas this is unhygienic | High | - The dog will not be permitted in the hall or kitchen while food is prepared or consumed. <br> - The dog will never be allowed in the kitchen area | Low |
| Cleaning hands after interacting with the school dog | If hands are not cleaned after interaction, germs could be transferred | High | - Reminders to children to wash hands immediately after interaction <br> - Regular flea and worm treatments given <br> - Regular grooming and baths given | Low |
| Walking the dog on and off site | Children could be harmed if they are not focused Children might be harmed if they do not interact correctly when the dog is out for a walk | High | - Ensure dog is always on a lead when off site walking <br> - Provide treats for dog's good behaviour <br> - If near other members of the community/ dogs Mrs BW to manage the lead <br> - Ensure children know and understand the code for walking the dog and that they feel confident to do so by starting with simple walks on site to assess skills and confidence. | Low |
| Visits to classroom | If the dog visits a class and the children do not follow the correct procedure she may become excited or scared | Med | - Ensure codes of interaction are known and understood by the children and staff <br> - Ensure visits to classrooms are planned with a clear purpose. <br> - Control of the dog to be managed by a confident adult. | Low |
| Being fed | Children may become ill if they consume food. | Low | - Feeding unlikely due to feeding times outside of school time <br> - If feeding does occur, this will be supervised by an adult. <br> - The food will be tipped into the bowl from a container without any contact with | Low |
