## **Introduction**

Fifi was bought as a puppy, born on February 14<sup>th</sup> 2012 and is a family pet. She belongs to Mrs Bradley-Wyatt. Fifi is a Yorkie Terrier mixed with a little Chihuahua. Fifi is a calm and friendly dog who has been socialised with children of all ages. Fifi regularly visits the vets and is up to date with all flea, worm and innoculations. She is deemed fit and healthy. While the school has been open to key worker children, Fifi has made some visits with the permission of parents. She has shown she has an excellent temperament and the children present have already made strong connections with the children. In a recent questionnaire (2.6.2020), all children attending said that they would like Fifi to visit and had clear purposeful reasons for this.
